



Who was Titus?

- A Greek Gentile Christian, likely converted and discipled by the Apostle Paul.
- Followed Paul to Jerusalem; Corinth;
 Rome; and Dalmatia (now Croatia).
- He also led the church in Crete,
 which this epistle addresses. He would
 later be known as the Bishop of Crete.
- Paul's letter to Titus is known as one of the three "Pastoral Epistles" (including 1 & 2 Timothy), as they are the 3 NT letters sent to individuals who oversaw churches.



Titus 1:1-4 · What it takes to be godly

- 1 Paul, a servant of God and an apostle of Jesus Christ to further the faith of God's elect and their knowledge of the truth that leads to godliness—
- 2 in the hope of eternal life, which God, who does not lie, promised before the beginning of time,
- 3 and which now at His appointed season He has brought to light through the preaching entrusted to me by the command of God our Saviour,
- 4 To Titus, my true son in our common faith:

 Grace and peace from God the Father and Christ Jesus our Saviour.

Godliness = our RESPONSE to the Truth

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


The knowledge of Christ is taught to us by faithful men and women whom He has appointed, entrusted and commanded to preach/teach the truth.

Intentional disciple-making = Reproducing true sons with a common faith.

As a *Priesthood of all believers*, we are <u>ALL</u> called to guide and influence, formally or informally! This role is NOT limited to only Elders and Pastors!

Titus 1:5-9 • What it takes to be a godly leader 5 The reason I left you in Crete was that you might put in order what was left unfinished and appoint elders in every town, as I directed you. 6 An elder must be blameless, faithful to his wife, a man whose children believe and are not open to the charge of being wild and disobedient. 7 Since an overseer manages God's household, he must be blameless not overbearing, not quick-tempered, not given to drunkenness, not violent, not pursuing dishonest gain. 8 Rather, he must be hospitable, one who loves what is good, who is self-controlled, upright, holy and disciplined. 9 He must hold firmly to the trustworthy message as it has been taught, so that he can encourage others by sound doctrine and refute those who oppose it.

Has a leader faithfully tried his best to be a godly parent? Then apply wisdom with grace.





Ultimately, God spells out these standards for a reason.

And as far as possible, we hold tightly to the Word of God.





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1 Timothy 3:2-10 • Qualifications for Overseers

- Now the overseer is to be above reproach, faithful to his wife, temperate, self-controlled, respectable, hospitable, able to teach,
 not given to drunkenness, not violent but gentle, not quarrelsome, not a lover of money.
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 5 (If anyone does not know how to manage his own family, how can he take care of God's church?)
- He must not be a recent convert, or he may become conceited and fall under the same judgment as the devil.
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How does this inform how BBTC views leadership?

1. We take Scripture as Ordinance, not Optional

- What the Bible says, we take as Command/Decree/Regulation.
- We take seriously the call to appoint elders/leaders (v5).
 We take seriously the criteria for appointing elders/leaders (v6-9).
- So anyone intending to serve or lead in BBTC must observe a period of first being plugged into body-life and thereafter probation within the ministry, for us to observe first-hand your character, competence, and chemistry.
 - We do not place human emphasis where the Bible does not. (Note what is *not* listed. Eg wealth? Job title? Powerful network?)

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How does this inform how BBTC views leadership?

- 1. We take Scripture as Ordinance, not Optional
- 2. We take Scripture as a <u>Standard</u>, not a <u>Stick</u>
 - Qualifications for leaders are to ensure a church of good order, of a **high and holy bar**. "Be holy, like your Father in heaven is holy."
- We hold leaders accountable to this high standard in a loving posture – always with the heart to help them succeed.
- Scripture is meant to be *useful* (2 Tim 3:16), not harmful.

 Don't *weaponise* Scripture. Don't use it as a way to criticise leaders.
- Allow the Word itself to pierce the soul and discern a leader's heart (Heb 4:12). We do not need to add **human judgmentalism** to this.

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How does this inform how BBTC views leadership?

- 1. We take Scripture as Ordinance, not Optional
- 2. We take Scripture as a Standard, not a Stick
- 3. We take Scripture as an **Encouragement**, not an **Excuse**
- The qualifications are there **not to disqualify people**, but **to spur us towards those qualities**.
- The Bible has many examples of overseers who **did not** fulfil every criteria. Yet they were appointed and anointed. Wisdom + grace!
 - Do not use these passages to disqualify/excuse yourself! If you are approached to lead, don't be quick to reject. Take it as encouragement by your leader that they see the potential in you.

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- 3. We take Scripture as an **Encouragement**, not an **Excuse**
- And on that note ... we encourage you to consider stepping up as leaders. (Remember, leadership is about being a servant, not boss!)
- Firstly, in whatever ministry or cell you are currently in.
- But three ministries in ministry are in great need of more leaders: Children. Youth. Young Adults. Shaping the future starts now.

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- As the early church grew, some zealot Jewish believers insisted that the Gentile converts would have to be circumcised like them.
- In Acts 15, the Jerusalem Council decided that Gentile converts would not need to observe every Jewish law, including circumcision.
- Paul had to deal with this issue often. In Rom 2, Phil 3 and Col 2, he wrote about how it should not be viewed as physical, but spiritual circumcision "circumcision of the heart".

What is the <u>root</u> of such rebellion?

- Human influence tradition, interpretation, preferences.
 We follow what others have always done, without checking the Word. eg candles.
 Our human experience may cause us to reject the Truth. eg cessationism.
- Corrupted minds and consciences.
 An untruth must take root, be watered, before eventually bearing fruit.
 Corruption takes time. Lesson: Constantly check ourselves with fear/trembling.
 Is my mind pure? Are my actions in line with God, or do they deny/defy Him?
- Unsound doctrine.

"If anyone teaches a different doctrine and does not agree with the sound words of our Lord Jesus Christ and the teaching that accords with godliness, he is puffed up with conceit and understands nothing. He has an unhealthy craving for controversy and for quarrels about words ..." 1 TIMOTHY 6:3-4



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"They claim to know God, but by their actions they deny Him."
No one ever thinks they are being rebellious. We discern them by their fruit.

Deceptive talk.

Persuading others contrary to the Word of God.

Deception is subtle, eg using the Word in a manner it is not intended to be used.

Disruptive influence.

Their actions divide, not unite; cause fights within family.

Dishonest gain.

A. Financial gain. Hence BBTC prohibits "business talk" in church or Cell.

B. Other gains. They may seek power, control, influence, adulation, etc.

Disobedience.

They may feel justified; they may interpret Scripture to validate disobedience. But the proof is in the manner of disobedience. Rude or respectful?



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So if this is a picture of "rebellious" members.

then we should strive for the opposite:

- Deceptive talk. → Edifying talk.
 - "Let no corrupting talk come out of your mouths ... only such as is good for building up ... give grace to those who hear." EPH 4:29
- Disruptive influence. ➤ Be peace-makers and unity-builders.

 Make every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace. EPHESIANS 4:3
- Dishonest gain.
 Care for others.

"Let each of you look not only to his own interests, but also to the interests of others." PHIL 2:4

Disobedience.
 Obedience. Alignment. Submissive & Teachable.
 "Obey your leaders and submit to them, for they are keeping watch over your souls." HEBREWS 13:17



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SO WHAT?

- Every church will have its fair share of "Cretans" deceptive, disruptive, dishonest and disobedient members the result of unsound doctrine.
- This is why we need more good leaders!
- We need more leaders to teach/guide/influence other believers "what is appropriate to sound doctrine" (2:1)
- Sound doctrine will turn "Cretans" towards Christlikeness:
 Edifying, peace-loving, unity-building, caring, obedient, submissive ...
- Have you been impacted by a good leader/mentor/teacher?
 Then perhaps it's time to pay it forward as a leader!

What does it take to be godly?
It starts with us knowing the truth of God's goodness enough to want to respond with godly lives.
